V. S. Gaitonde (b. 1924-2001)


V. S. Gaitonde was born in Nagpur, Maharashtra and studied at the Sir J. J. School of Airt. Mumbai. The artist was closely associated with the Progressive Artists Group in its last phase. Considered as one of country's foremost abstractionist, his artworks have a subliminal quality with the texture being rich to almost luminating, arrived at with the layors of paints in the artist's signature style. With an inherent spiritual quality, the artworks are brilliant manipulation of form, colour and technique that are almost lyrical. The artist was awarded the first prize at the Young Asian Artists Exhibition, Tokyo in 1952 and the Rockefeller Fellowship in 1964. He was awarded the Padma Shri in 1971.



Jitish Kallat (b.1974)

itish Kallat born in Mumbai and graduated in Painting from the Sir J. J. School of Art, Mumbai (1996). The artist's works are recognisable for his use of self image working across a variety of media including painting, sculpture, photography and installation. Kallat regularly exploits his immediate urban environment in the city of Mumbai as well as pivotal episodes in history for themes, affording

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
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S. H. Raza (b. 1922)



Anjolie Ela Menon (b.1940)

njolie Ela Menon is one of India's leading Contemporary female artists. She studied art at Sir J. J. School of Art, Mumbai, which she left midway to study in Europe. A scholarship enabled her to study at the Atelier Fresque, Ecole Nationale des Beaux Art in Paris (1959 - 61). Her preferred medium is oil on masonite and mixed media though the artist has also worked in other media including glass, watercolour, etc. She is a well-known muralist with a mastery over colours. Not conforming to a particular style, the artist has experimented with media and themes, constantly reworking on her oeuvre through some motifs like window frames, haunting female nudes, and priests which have frequented her works. The artist was awarded the Padma Shri in 2000.



Sakti Burman (b.1935)

orn in Calcutta, Sakti Burman studied at the Government College of Arts, Calcutta and at the Ecole Nationale des Beaux Arts, Paris. The artist's works are known for their dream like narratives with the imagery steeped in romanticism and fantasy. Mythical creatures, sensuously painted women, exotic animals and flora & fauna dwell in the works of the artist. The artist textures the surface of his canvases akin to the ageing frescos. His work has been shown extensively in museums in France including Musee de Blois, Musee de Villeneuve-sur-Lot and the Musee Denon, Chalon-sur-Rhone. He has participated in the Paris Biennales of 1963-65-67. The artist lives and works in Paris.
