CHRONOLOGY OF EVENTS

1932

July The Aviation Department of Tata Sons Ltd. established.

October 15

Tata Sons Ltd. began first Karachi-Ahmedabad-Bombay-Bellary-Madras mail service to connect with Imperial Airways' London-Karachi services. The First Service carried mail which left London on October 8 and was operated by D. H. Puss Moth VT-ADN flown by Mr. J. R. D. Tata (now Chairman of Air India) from Karachi to Bombay and by Mr. Nevill Vintcent from Bombay to Madras. The first service arrived at Madras on October 16 and the first west-bound flight left Madras on October 17. This marked the beginning of Commercial Aviation in India.

1935

January 4 The Karachi-Bombay-Madras service was rerouted via Hyderabad instead of Bellary. Frequency increased to twice weekly.

February 25 Tata Sons made a trial flight Bombay-Nagpur-Jamshedpur - Calcutta with Fox Moth VT-ADZ (Pilot Mr. Nevill Vintcent).

November 26 Experimental weekly mail service started on route Bombay-Goa-Cannanore-Trivandrum with Miles Merlins. This connected with the Karachi-Bombay-Madras service.

1936

December Survey flight to Colombo.

During the year Tata Sons Ltd. introduced Waco YQC-6 hiplanes.

1937

April 16 Bhuj introduced as a stop on Bombay-Karachi service.

November 6

Tata Sons began Bombay-Indore-Bhopal-Gwalior-Delhi service with Waco YQC-6 biplanes. The first flight by VT-AIX (Pilots Mr. J.R.D. Tata and Mr. Nevill Vintcent.)

December 1 W/T facilities were brought into operation on the Karachi - Bom - bay-Colombo route.

During the year Tata Sons introduced D.H. 89 Dragon Rapides equipped with radio.

1938

Tata Air Lines (successor to airline operation of Tata Sons) extended its Karachi-Bombay-Madras Mail Service to Colombo.

Waco YQC - 6 biplanes were used. Passengers and Mail from Colombo were carried from January 29.

Government contract with Tata Air Lines came into effect for the carriage of first class unsurcharged mail between Karachi-Colombo under the Empire Air Mail Scheme. The route was Karachi-Bhuj-Ahmedabad-Bombay-Hyderabad-Madras-Trichina-poly-Colombo.

March 2 Tata Air Lines extended its Bombay-Trivandrum service to Trichinapoly. 1939

Rapides and D.H. 86s requisitioned by the Government.

Secondhand tri-motor Stinsons purchased.

First Booking Office opened at Churchgate.

1941

November 1 Tata Air Lines began nonscheduled flight between Karachi and Baghdad via Jiwani, Sharjah, Bahrain and Basra. DC-2s loaned by the Government of India were used.

During the year Tata Air Lines introduced Stinson Model A threeengined monoplanes.

1942

February

Mr. Nevill Vintcent met with an accidental death when the plane in which he was travelling was shot down over the coast of France.

August Douglas DC-2s on loan from the Government of India introduced on Bombay-Karachi route.

Participation in the evacuation of Baghdad during the Rashid Ali revolt.

1943

During the year Douglas DC-3s and Beechcraft Expeditors received from the Government.

1944

March 1 Tata Air Lines introduced DC-3s on twice weekly Bombay-Karachi and on a weekly Bombay-Bangalore-Colombo service.

1945

April 16 Tata Air Lines began twice weekly Bombay-Nagpur-Calcutta service with DC-3s.

April 25 Bombay-Bangalore-Coimbatore service started with DC-3s.

June 24 Weekly Bombay-Bangalore-Madras service started with DC-3s.

July 3 The twice weekly Bombay - Nagpur - Calcutta service with DC-3s ceased.

August/
December

Four surplus DC-3s allotted to Tata Air Lines by the United
States surplus property authorities. In addition, Tata Air Lines
bought and leased a total of about eight DC-3s directly from the
U.S. Office of Foreign Liquidation Commissioner.

1946

January 1 Indian Civil Aviation restored to commercial status.

July 29 Tata Airlines converted into a public company and renamed Air-India Limited.

Genell Moots of TWA came from Kansas City to train India's first air hostesses.

1947

April 13

Air-India received the first of its fleet of Vickers-Armstrongs
Vikings. This was VT-CIY.

August 3

Mrs. Vijayalakshmi Pandit, First Indian Ambassador to the U.S.S.R., left India for Moscow in the Air-India DC-3 VT-ATI (Capt. A.C. Gazder). The DC-3 flew the Indian flag for the first time.

March 8 Air-India International incorporated.

June 15 Bombay-Nairobi frequency increased to once a week.

July 26 Karachi included as a halt on the Bombay-Nairobi service.

October 15 Frequency on U.K. route increased to four flights a week.

October 17 Introduction of twice a week Bombay-Calcutta extension to India - U.K. route.

June 8 Name of Air-India International abbreviated to Air-India by an amendment to the Air Corporation's Act. April 1 Commencement of Triangular Pool between Air-India, Aden Air-ways and E.A.A.C. for traffic between Aden and Nairobi.

May 29 Arrival of 1st Boeing 707-337B aircraft (VT-DPM-Makalu) in Bombay.

July 1 Proving flight to Nadi (Fiji) from Sydney.

August 1 Frequency to U.K. increased to 8 times a week,

August 3 Sydney Service extended to Nadi.

October 1 Commencement of Pool between Air-India and Middle East Air - lines for passenger traffic to and from Beirut.

October 2 Extension of Bombay-Moscow service to London concurrently with the increase in frequency to twice a week, thus providing ten flights a week between Bombay and London, eight via Middle East and two via Moscow.

December 16 Curtailment of services for operational reasons.

Services to Tokyo reduced to twice a week, one via Calcutta and one via Delhi. Eighth frequency to U.K. (i.e. terminator) also withdrawn. Frequency to U.K. thus reduced to 9 times a week with seven flights via Middle East and two via Moscow.

1965

March 14 Arrival of 2nd Boeing 707-337B aircraft (VT-DSI - Lhotse) in Bombay.

April 1 Operation of a daily Contract Service for I.A.C. on Bombay Calcutta route with Boeing 707s instead of Bombay-Delhi route.

April 5 Introduction of VC-10s chartered from B.O.A.C. on a weekly service to Kuwait in place of Comet 4s. Halt at Karachi discontinued. Karachi now becomes an Off-line station.

July 19 Construction work started on New Administrative Building.

July 22 Pool Agreement signed with Japan Air Lines covering Bombay-Tokyo route, effective October 1, 1965.

September 10 Jakarta service terminated at Singapore.

October 1 Curtailed services restored.

Services to Tokyo increased to thrice a week, two via Calcutta and one via Delhi. Seven services a week to New York via London. Eighth frequency to U.K. (i.e. terminator) restored. Frequency to U.K. thus increased to 10 services a week with 8 flights via Middle East and 2 via Moscow.

October 3 Zurich introduced on India/U.K./U.S.A. route.

1966

February 11 Bombay-Calcutta-Bombay IAC Contract Service suspended.

March 18 Normal operations suspended.

April 8 Normal operations resumed.

October 14 Arrival of third Boeing 707-337B Aircraft VT-DVA (Annapoorna) in Bombay.

October 25 Frequency of Nairobi service increased to thrice weekly, one direct and two via Aden.

December 1 Frequency on Bombay-London route increased to 11 flights a week, 9 via West Asia and 2 via Moscow.

Bombay-Singapore service extended to Sydney via Perth thereby increasing the frequency of Sydney service to two.

Frequency through Cairo increased to five times a week in each direction with a technical halt on flights AI-111 and AI-112.

Frequency through Zurich increased to twice a week in westbound direction only.

Frequency through Prague increased to twice a week in both the directions without traffic rights between New York-Prague-New York on flights AI-116 and AI-103.

1967

February 1 Reintroduction of Bombay - Calcutta - Bombay daily contract service for I. A. C.

February 14 Arrival of First Boeing 707-337C aircraft (VT-DVB - Kamet) in Bombay.

This non-stop flight covered 4, 931 statute miles between London-Bombay in 7 hours and 54 minutes, setting a new speed record for any Boeing.

Commencement of Australia/Asia Pool between Air-India; April 1 B.O.A.C.; Qantas; Malaysia Singapore Airlines and Air New Zealand on Singapore/Sydney/Singapore and Singapore/Jakarta/ Singapore sectors.

Teheran introduced as an online station.

Frequency on Bombay/London route increased to 12 flights a week, 4 via Cairo; 4 via Beirut; 2 via Teheran and 2 via Moscow.

Frequency to Delhi 6 times a week in both the directions.

Frequency to Frankfurt increased to 5 times a week.

Reintroduction of once a week Bombay/Jakarta service. Fre-April 2 quency to Madras and Singapore increased to 3 times a week.

Introduction of Brussels on India/U.K. route with once a week April 5 frequency. With introduction of Brussels, Teheran and Jakarta, Air-India have 29 online stations on its Magic Carpet route covering five continents.

August 15 Fortnightly service to Mauritius inaugurated.
