



Celebrations in London to Commemorate 50 Years of Air-India's Maiden International Flight

A ir-India's historic maiden international flight, operated with "Malabar Princess", a 40-

seater Lockheed Constellation, from Bombay to London via Cairo and Geneva on June 8,

Capt. K. Mohan, Director of Operations, shaking hands with Capt. K. R. Guzder who operated the Bombay-Cairo leg of Air-India's first international flight to London on June 8, 1948. Looking on is Mr Maneck Dalal who started our London office from scratch 50 years ago.

1948, was recreated 50 years later on June 8, 1998.

Instead of the Constellation, a state-of-the-art aircraft in its time, which took more than 24 hours to reach London as compared to almost a third now, Capt. K. Mohan, Director of Operations, commanded a Boeing 747-400. The aircraft, equipped with all the latest inflight gadgetry, carried 417 passengers on board and its arrival in the morning at London's Heathrow Airport was celebrated with champagne. Among those who were present on the occasion to welcome the passengers and the crew were 83-year-old Capt. K.R. Guzder, who had piloted the Bombay-Cairo leg of Air-India's first international flight; Mr Maneck Dalal, who founded our office in London in 1948: and officials of Air-India and Heathrow Airport, London.

Later in the evening, a reception was held at London's Mayfair Intercontinental Hotel,

where Pt. Jasraj and Pt. Hariprasad Chaurasia, Indian maestros, regaled a select gathering of our commercial contacts with their brilliant performance.

Speaking on the occasion after lighting the traditional lamp, Mr Salman Haider, Indian High Commissioner for UK, recalled "Air-India's flight used to land in Cairo in the middle of the night. When I was posted there, I have memories of rushing off to the airport regularly at the unearthly hour of 3 a.m. to meet dignitaries either coming or going."

Earlier, Mr P. K. Sinha, Regional Director-UK and Ireland, while welcoming the guests, traced the growth of the airline during the 50 years that have elapsed since Air-India's epoch-making flight to London on June 8, 1948. "The UK," he averred, "has been and will

always be the focus of attention for our airline." As Air-India has always passionately believed in promoting the culture and tradition of India, the national carrier's commitment to support the Indian community in the UK would continue with greater vigour, he added.

Mr Sinha read out a message sent by Mr M. P. Mascarenhas, Managing Director. The message read: "Fifty years later we look forward to the future with confidence and rededicate ourselves to the ideals of (JRD Tata) our founder to provide the highest standard of service to all our customers."

Mr H. S. Uberoi, Commercial Director, in his message which said, "This is a time for deep introspection to review our past performance and renew our endeavours to strive to be the best if we are to compete successfully with the soaring eagles of this highly competitive industry."

Mr Dalal reminisced the state of the infrastructure at London Airport and how Air-India began its operations from a caravan with oil heating. "We had a stark choice," he said, "...either we had to suffocate from the oil fumes or turn off our lamps and freeze to death." Officials had to wade through slush to reach the airline's control tower at the airport and the London fog constantly ensured flights would be diverted to Schiphol or Scotland, he added.

The celebrations were a resounding success, judging by the number of congratulatory letters received from eminent personalities including Lord Swraj Paul and Mr Peter Morrisroe OBE, Managing Director, Airport Coordination Limited, UK.

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
